NETWORKING: A PROFESSIONAL ACTIVITY

The structure and form of language evolves over time. Words and phrases are introduced and integrated into the cultural framework of a society or group. Networking can be described as a process through which individuals or groups share ideas, provide information, offer advice and support and gain access to a range of resources.

Nurses can engage in networking activities in a variety of ways, and EfCCNa is committed to the provision of networking opportunities for critical care nurses. The development of this journal has promoted the exchange of ideas and information; indeed we would like to see a greater level of debate and dialogue emerging within its pages. The structure and organisation of this conference provides opportunities for nurses to meet, debate and discuss critical care nursing issues. Individuals and groups will be able to meet in both formal and informal settings to exchange ideas and information.

Participation in conferences should provide a mix of scientific and social activity; they should provide opportunities for reflection, stimulation and relaxation, all of which have direct benefits for patients, their families, nurses and other members of the multidisciplinary team.

Disseminating information and working collaboratively are key features of professional practice. Through participation in networking activities, critical care nurses have the potential for:

- Developing a shared vision of critical care practice
- Providing and gaining inspiration to develop practice
- Recognising and celebrating the value of collegial relationships
- Establishing the most challenging and stimulating forum for problem-solving.
