EDITORIAL

Paediatric critical care nursing is a specialty with a wide-ranging scope of practice. Paediatric intensive care unit (PICU) nurses care for children of all ages and sometimes even young adults in the same unit, and often during the same shift. Paediatric patients may present with a straightforward problem or with an exceedingly multifaceted disease process. Practising as a nurse in this intricate environment entails a solid foundation in the fundamentals, evidence-based clinical practice, a craving for continuous learning, and an aspiration to provide a supportive presence to child and family. PICU nurses make a unique contribution to the patient care experience by creating the environment in which all critically ill children can benefit from the expert care of an exceptionally skilled team of healthcare professionals. PICU nurses also ensure that patients and families are partners with the healthcare team in assuring the best possible outcome.

One area in which PICU nurses have made significant progress, more than any other ICU nursing subspecialty, is in integrating family-centered care into the practice of critical care. Family-centered care is more than just unrestricted parent access to their children. It is including families as valued members of the healthcare team. Family members should be included in multidisciplinary rounds to ensure that their input is integrated into the child's plan of care. Evidence supports this practice. Families rely upon nurses to make the critical care experience more humane for their child and they expect nurses to be the liaison with physicians and other disciplines. Nurses are often the "interpreters", explaining complex information to families in words that they can understand. PICU nurses have gone beyond the identification of family needs to providing evidence for interventions that patients and families find helpful. We give families what they need to help their child.

There are times in the PICU when despite the very best care, cure is no longer possible. At this point, nurses alter their focus to achieving death with dignity and consolation. Nurses support parents and family members through the worst experience in the world, the death of their child. Nurses often manage the experience for patients and families when death is impending. Numerous studies have shown that parents are often dissatisfied with the communication from the healthcare team leading up to the death. Again, nurses play a vital role as interpreters during this time. In addition, nurses often are the ones to provide comfort in the time after the death, even as the physicians have finished talking to the parents. Many times, it is nurses that contact the parents weeks or months after the death to follow up on
